A TRIBUTE



On the final evening of the annual Tar Heel Chapter annual assembly, one table remained unoccupied, its place settings undisturbed. Dedicated to the memory of those who are no longer among us, this table was a tribute and a reminder of three faithful Pioneers who have left their earthly home.

Irene Gainey Darden, affectionately known as Miss Irene, was born in Sampson County on June 12, 1928. She was one of 17 children and was the last surviving sibling until her passing on November 16, 2022.

Miss Irene's large family surely prepared her for motherhood, because she was, as her children will attest, a wonderful mother to her five children (Ann, Debbie, Dwight, Victor, and Vickie). During her 94 years Miss Irene saw her family grow to include 13 grandchildren and 21 great grandchildren. Her husband Marion preceded her in death by 33 years. Marion is the one who introduced Miss Irene to the world of telephony. The ITPA Pioneers grew to love Miss Irene and considered her to be the matriarch of the assembly. No one dressed spiffier. She was always "put together." Her outfits and jewelry were always coordinated, her hair was perfectly styled and her nails were perfectly manicured. Not in a vain way, mind you, but in the sense that she always put her best foot forward. Her laugh and her sweet smile were the highlights of her attire. There was always a spark of mischief in her dark brown eyes. She had a quick wit and was a genuinely warm person to be around.

Once the telephony bug bit Miss Irene, she continued associating with the telephone crowd even after Marion's death. her, she continued associating with the telephone crowd. A few years back, she and Mr. Bob Riddle hit the ITPA scene at assembly. The Dardens and Riddles had long known one another. Bob, like Marion, was a WWII veteran who had worked at Star Telephone Company. Miss Irene and Mr. Bob had much in common, and they were good companions for one another, attending ITPA events and traveling together. The two were close friends and ITPA regulars until Bob's passing in 2012.

Afterwards, Miss Irene's family ensured she was able to continue attending ITPA events. Her connection to and her ability to visit with so many good friends likely contributed to her longevity. Miss Irene's daughters, Vickie Giddens and Ann O'Donnell, and her son-in-law Carroll Giddens who served as her faithful chauffer for many years, attended this year's Tar Heel Chapter gathering. We are grateful to the Darden family for sharing Miss Irene with us for so many years, and we're glad that they are a part of our ITPA family.

Bill and Joe Lawrence

Mr. Joe Lawrence passed away this year on February 22nd. Though his brother Bill predeceased him 14 years ago on July 19, 2010, we paid tribute during the annual assembly to both brothers, each having been steadfast ITPA supporters.

ITPA Tar Heel Chapter Pioneers are all very familiar with the *Bill and Joe Lawrence College Scholarship Fund*. The brothers established the scholarship fund to assist children of Tar Heel Chapter Pioneers with college tuition. Since then, scholarships have been awarded annually through their generosity.

Bill and Joe were the 8th and 9th, respectively of 11 siblings; and they were active from their childhoods in the same church. They both supported their church, civic and community interests long after their retirement for as long as their health permitted.

William Walter Lawrence, always known as Bill, was born on April 15, 1928. He worked at Heins Telephone for 37 years and was vice president when he retired in 1984. He then worked as a consultant for Alltel for 3 years. Until 1991, he continued serving as a director for Mid-South Bank, which he helped to found; was an investor in Pinewild Inc., a Pinehurst golfing community; and as a director for Mac's Business Machines. Bill served the Boy Scouts in many capacities and was recognized at the highest levels in the Occoneechee Council of the organization in 2008 for service spanning over 50 years.

He was also active with the Salvation Army, the Rotary Club, United Way, the Boys and Girls Club, and he served on the boards of the Duke Cancer Center, Wingate University, Central Carolina CC, and Meredith College.

Bill was an active member of the First Baptist Church of Sanford his entire life, serving as both a deacon and as a member of many of the church's committees. He also enjoyed being a member of the St. Luke Methodist Church Wednesday Morning Men's Prayer Group. His commitment to God and his church was always his priority.



Joseph "Joe" Thaddeus Lawrence, Jr. was born on November 23, 1929. His large and loving family shaped his values, habits, and attitudes. He learned to value family and education, to be resourceful, and to serve others. Bill's work tenure began at age 11 as

a newspaper carrier. At age 13 he delivered milk. As an older teen he worked at Collins Press and as an usher at Temple Movie Theater. He was a Boy Scout in youth and as an adult he served on the Scouting Committee for years. He also served in the National Guard for six years.

Joe attended Campbell Junior College while working as a roofer and brick mason assistant, and while working at Sanford Tobacco Company. He also studied at UNC -Chapel Hill for a bit, working in the Lenoir Hall dining area to pay for meals, and then returned to Campbell College. After graduating in 1953 with a business degree, he accepted the Plant Accountant position at Heins Telephone Company. He later served as Purchasing Agent and then as Commercial Manager, the role from which he retired in 1989 after 36 years with the company. Joe was a long-time member of the Tar Heel Chapter of the ITPA and held many positions, including president.

Joe served his church in many capacities, was a Jaycee and a Kiwanis Club member, and was an avid supporter of The Salvation Army. He worked with community leaders to revitalize downtown Sanford and served as chairman of the group in 1990. He served as a guide at the Railroad House Museum. Joe was an avid reader, and could often be found in the Lee County Library pouring over newspapers and historical books.

Family was of utmost importance to Joe, and he valued the precious times spent with his wife Betty to whom he was married for nearly 60 years, their daughters Susan Lee Lawrence and Beth Adcock, his son-in-law Paul Adcock, and his grandchildren, who affectionately called him "Papa Joe." Joe also treasured his extended family, which consisted of in-laws, nieces and nephews, and many treasured friends. He is missed by all.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT SHINES ON BILL JOINER

The man, the myth, the legend...meet Bill Joiner, long time Carotel Pioneer and community servant.

Bill has been a Carotel Pioneer for as long as most of our Carotel members can remember. Bill worked for Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company for 37 years, and during that time he spent many hours volunteering as a Pioneer serving his community.

A native of Hopkinsville, KY, Bill became a permanent North Carolina resident in 1964 after having served in the U.S. Air Force for 4 years. Bill continued his military service until his E-8 military retirement, having served 3 years in the N.C. National Guard and 23 years in the U.S. Army Reserve.

After retiring, Bill wasn't nearly ready to slow down, so he ran for town commissioner of Trent Woods, NC where he and his wife Judy have resided for more than 39 years. Bill still serves as a town commissioner and some residents say that if the town's children could vote, he'd hold the office for life. Bill has lived his adult life volunteering to help others, particularly if children are the ones being helped.

Those who know Bill may have wondered about his beard. Bill is a long-time Santa Claus, having begun his Santa tradition years ago at James W. Smith Elementary School. He kept his naturally white beard trimmed for most of the year, and for years during the holiday season he made Santa appearances across multiple counts events hosted for foster children and other events.

He has also suited up for Santa events at Temple Baptist Church, Garber United Methodist Church and Asbury United Methodist Church. Bill said of his Santa experiences, "You let a four-year-old hug your neck and you're hooked. If you don't love children, something's wrong with you." A Scottish Rite and Yor Rite Mason and Shriner, Bill has appeared in many parades over the years with the "Hooligans," the Sudan Shriner's parade unit, of which Bill is an original member.

There was a time not too long ago when Bill greeted many of the Trent Woods children every morning and afternoon on their way to and from school, and they happily greet "Mr. Bill" by name each time they saw him. Greeting the children was easy since Bill's volunteering efforts included serving as a crossing guard. When Bill was approached by the town's police chief to serve as a crossing guard for Bengert Elementary School, his response was, "I volunteer for everything else, so I may as well."

When Bill was interviewed about his service to the town of Trent Woods, Bill said of his crossing guard experience that it was only after he agreed to do it that he found out he would actually get paid for the gig.

The kids showed Bill how much he meant to them when, at the end of a school year, the Bangert Elementary School children honored him by dedicating the Spirit Rock outside the school for a week in his honor. One of the second graders who participated said of Bill, "Mr. Bill is so nice and loves us all." Bill served as a crossing guard for 8 years.

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MEMBER SPOTLIGHT SHINES ON BILL JOINER

Bill was dedicated to helping kids long before his crossing guard duties. He volunteered for 20 years as a referee for youth basketball and an umpire for youth baseball. In his younger years Bill coached Babe Ruth Baseball and Little League Baseball. His dedication, however, extends to both the young and old. After helping the New Bern-Craven County Jaycees run the fairgrounds for several years, he was selected as "N.C. Jaycees Outstanding Senior."

Bill also served as a volunteer firefighter for 20 years and he now serves on the Retired Firemen's Board. He is an active member of Tabernacle Baptist Church, and he serves on the "Town's Citizen Emergency Response Team" and the local Community Watch program.



The 2024-2025 Tar Heel Chapter Officers and Directors were elected during the chapter's August business meeting.



Carotel is affiliated with the ITPA Tar Heel Chapter in Region 3. All Carotel Pioneers are invited and encouraged to participate in our state chapter activities and events. The national ITPA was founded in 1920 by members of the independent telecommunications industry as a way to serve the communities they lived and worked in.

The Carotel Club was formed on July 1, 1971 under the previously existing Tar Heel Chapter. The club initially consisted of members who were employed by Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company and required 15 years of service as a condition of membership. Over the years, the club's by-laws were revised, as companies were merged and acquired, to welcome Sprint and Embarq telecommunications associates, and the required length of service was reduced. In recent years, a new membership category was adopted by the ITPA to allow "Friends of Pioneers" to become Pioneers. And we need new members! Invite someone today.
